Minnesota



As the Upper Midwest's business and financial center, the Twin Cities metropolitan area is home to several household-name brands, spanning retail, insurance, medical devices and financial institutions. On that latter sector, much of the litigation in the Land of 10,000 Lakes is banking focused, with a particularly huge uptick in the number of creditors' remedy cases. The litigation market continues to contend with the fallout remaining from the \$3.5 billion Ponzi scheme led by suburban Minneapolis entrepreneur Tom Petters. Court filings have gone up in state and federal court, with toxic tort cases in particular making it to trial.

Highly recommended firms

Anthony Ostlund Baer & Louwagie

As the website of Minneapolis firm Anthony Ostlund Baer & Louwagie proclaims, "Business litigation isn't our primary focus. It's our only focus." The 19-lawyer boutique, founded in 1985, represents clients in a host of litigation matters; especially those concerning real estate, securities, banking, intellectual property and professional liability. Says a competitor, "Anthony Ostlund is well regarded and takes a very aggressive approach—you know; 'bet-the-company' litigation." In January 2012, the firm won at the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals affirming a ruling for its client, Camelot, the owner of downtown Minneapolis entertainment complex Block E in a leasing dispute with one of its tenants, AMC Showplace Theatres. Camelot purchased Block E in 2010, at which time it learned that the wording on AMC's terms and conditions on extending the lease was ambiguous. The US District Court first granted summary judgment in favor of Camelot; the Eighth Circuit affirmed it.

Name partner **Richard Ostlund** has been practicing since 1982, the same year Minnesota adopted its Business Corporation Act. During the ensuing 30 years, much of his litigation casework has involved this statute in some way. Ostlund is the head of a trial team that won a complete defense verdict in November 2011 on behalf of local car dealership Motorwerks in a dispute with an individual shareholder who claimed a right to more than \$7 million in distributions on his shares and more than \$8 million in fair value purchase of his shares. Firm founder and name partner **Joseph Anthony** also consistently gets plaudits from peers. "He's gotten some nice verdicts," says one peer. Another peer litigator says, "Generally speaking, if I have a conflict, I'll refer to people like Joe Anthony."

Dorsey & Whitney

Dorsey & Whitney has solid name recognition in the Twin Cities area, in the state of Minnesota and beyond, with 19

offices across the US, Canada, Europe, Asia, and Australia. The Minneapolis firm, which celebrates its 100th birthday in 2012, was founded to meet the needs of a sole client: the First National Bank of Minneapolis, known in the present day as US Bank. The firm has been the home of several national-level politicians and government figures, including US Senator from Minnesota Amy Klobuchar, former Vice-President Walter Mondale, former Iowa Governor Tom Vilsack and former Supreme Court Justice Harry Blackmun. A peer agrees, saying, "Dorsey is one of the most well known firms in town." The firm is representing a group of retired partners who were lawyers at the erstwhile firm Dewey & LeBoeuf with regards to pension payments following Dewey's bankruptcy.

Firm managing partner **Marianne Short** is known for her appellate practice. A former Minnesota state appellate judge, she wrote some 900 opinions during her 12-year term before returning to the firm in 2000. Her private practice clients have included several Minnesota-based companies such as Medica, UnitedHealth Group, 3M and Ceridian. Short also represented former Minnesota Governor Jesse Ventura in litigation concerning congressional redistricting in Minnesota in light of the 2000 US Census. **Peter Carter**, the co-chairperson of Dorsey & Whitney's securities litigation and enforcement group, regularly represents clients at Delaware Chancery Court, Delaware Supreme Court and before the SEC regarding corporate matters such as mergers and acquisitions as well as securities class actions, and has assisted corporations in internal investigations. His clients have included UnitedHealth Group, Ceridian, Metris Companies and Rainforest Café.

Faegre Baker Daniels

Longstanding Minneapolis firm Faegre & Benson, already Minnesota's largest firm, on January 1, 2012 merged with Indianapolis-based firm Baker & Daniels to create Faegre Baker Daniels, a regional legal presence with offices in three major Midwestern business and financial centers: Minneapolis, Chicago

and Indianapolis, in addition to 10 other offices scattered across Colorado, the Midwest, Washington, DC; the UK and China. The Minneapolis office remains Faegre Baker Daniels' largest, with more than 300 lawyers working out of that office. "I'm big on Faegre," says a peer, mentioning **Wendy Wildung** and **Charles "Chuck" Webber** as standouts. Both Webber and Wildung are known in Minnesota for their skills at the trial and appellate levels. Litigation matters handled by the firm include product liability, securities, employment, real estate litigation, intellectual property, health care, construction and general commercial disputes. The firm has counted nationally known names such as 3M, Target, Gander Mountain, Pfizer, Wyeth and Wells Fargo.

In June 2012, the firm secured a win on behalf of Thomson Reuters at the US Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit with regards to a patent infringement case filed by an Australian electronic publishing company largely involved in legal publications. TCF Financial subsidiary Winthrop Resources, which leases office technology equipment, has tapped Faegre Baker Daniels's Minneapolis office to assist in recouping \$35.55 million in funds allegedly owed by now-defunct law firm Dewey & LeBoeuf. During his career spanning more than three decades, product liability star **James O'Neal** has defended food companies and hormone therapy products, as well as several matters for Novartis Pharmaceuticals. **Joseph Price** also has a storied life sciences product liability practice, handling several matters concerning medical devices, over-the-counter pharmaceuticals and breast implants.

Greene Espel

Greene Espel moves to "highly recommended" from "recommended" status in this edition of *Benchmark Litigation* after garnering wide acclaim from peer firms in the Twin Cities. "Greene Espel should be elevated," says one such competitor. "It's a boutique litigation firm that is loaded with top-notch lawyers." Founded in 1993, the firm's casework touches on an array of practice areas including white-collar criminal defense, intellectual property, product liability and environmental law. Former US assistant attorney **Andrew Luger** gets wide acclaim for his practice, which largely consists of white-collar criminal work. "Andy Luger is really an A- to B- to C-type guy," says a peer. "He gets the whole picture." In the spring of 2012, he

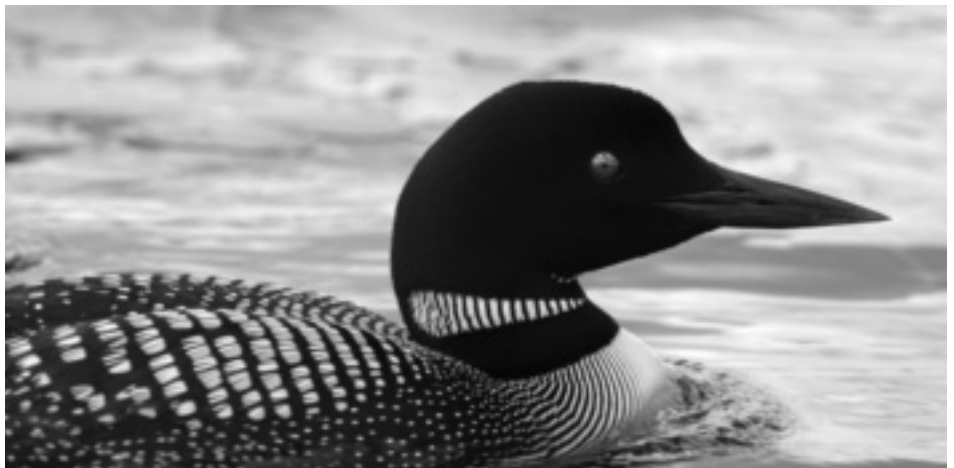
represented the ex-wife of an influential suburban Minneapolis real estate developer in a white-collar tax evasion case that received substantial coverage in local news media.

Co-founder and name partner **Clifford Greene**, who likewise gets consistent nods from peers, in December 2011 represented the Republic of Kenya at the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals, successfully arguing that exceptions to the Foreign Sovereign Immunities Act that would force a sovereign nation to litigate in the US did not apply. The decision affirmed that a sovereign nation, in this case Kenya, cannot be held liable for not preventing investment scams allegedly conducted by private entities within its borders. Fellow co-founder and name partner **Larry Espel** also gets name-checked for his general commercial, environmental, product liability, and construction litigation work. “Espel is a very good lawyer, at the top,” says a peer. **John Ursu**, who joins the local litigation star ranks from his previous status as future star, is described by competitors as “extremely eloquent.”

Robins Kaplan Miller & Ciresi

In the firm’s nearly 75 years, Robins Kaplan Miller & Ciresi has developed a national reputation for its aggressive representation of plaintiffs and defendants of large corporations, insurers and individuals. “Good litigators often tend not to be in large firms. Robins Kaplan Miller & Ciresi is the exception to the rule,” says a peer. The firm has offices in Atlanta, Los Angeles, Boston, New York and Naples, Florida; although more than half of the firm’s 200 lawyers work out of the firm’s Minneapolis headquarters. The firm, led by name partner **Michael Ciresi**, obtained \$30.1 million in damages on behalf of four non-profits whose money was invested by defendant Wells Fargo into risky complex structured investments without the plaintiff institutions’ consent. The jury found that Wells Fargo had breached fiduciary duty.

Martin Lueck and business litigation group chairperson **Jan Conlin** represented Medtronic in a patent case against Boston Scientific, obtaining a judgment in their clients’ favor. Conlin is also working on a case on behalf of landowners in North Dakota against that state with regards to mineral rights ownership disputes. The case involves issues dating from 1889, when North Dakota became a state. On the intellectual property front, national IP star **Ronald Schutz** is representing TiVo in an ongoing suit against Verizon with regards to claims that the New York-based telecom has infringed on three of TiVo’s patents. The case is expected to go to trial in late 2012 or early 2013 at the IP “rocket docket” of the Eastern District of Texas.

Winthrop & Weinstine

Since its founding in 1979 by six partners, the Minneapolis firm Winthrop & Weinstine has developed into a name brand in the Twin Cities area, with more than 100 attorneys on staff. In a personnel jump that made local headlines, six intellectual property partners joined the firm in January from fellow Minneapolis firm Dorsey & Whitney. Beyond IP, the firm handles an array of cases including product liability, real estate, health care, employment and general commercial matters. Among the firm’s longstanding clients is Warroad, Minnesota-based Marvin Windows, including an ongoing matter against Sapa Extrusions with hearings at the US District Court, District of Minnesota in rural Fergus Falls.

On the Marvin Windows team are perennially name-checked name partner **Robert Weinstine** and future star **Justice Ericson Lindell**. Weinstine routinely represents clients in antitrust, product liability, shareholder disputes, securities fraud and general commercial matters. “Bob throws bombs—in a good way!” raves a peer. Future star **Christianna Finnern** routinely handles health care and insurance coverage issues such as the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, Medicare and Medicaid, Stark Laws and anti-kickback issues. On the latter front, Finnern is representing a local Native American community against a check-cashing vendor alleged to be paying bribes to tribe members. Litigation department chairperson **Brooks Poley** handles an array of matters such as product liability claims,

intellectual property disputes, corporate and government antitrust matters and shareholder disputes. Among Poley’s highest-profile case matters with regards to shareholder issues is defending Wells Fargo against breach of fiduciary duty allegations filed by a group of pension funds. Winthrop & Weinstine was also tapped by the Minnesota Legislative Coordination Commission to represent them in legal disputes related to the proposed Minnesota constitutional amendment to mandate photo identification for voters.

Recommended firms

Blackwell Burke

A newcomer to the *Benchmark* rankings, the Minneapolis litigation boutique Blackwell Burke quickly has been making inroads during its short time in the Twin Cities market. Founding partner **Jerry Blackwell** specializes in toxic tort litigation and product liability defense—specifically for the food industry. He won a complete defense victory on behalf of ConAgra Foods in the first-ever “popcorn lung” case to go to trial in the US. The plaintiffs claimed \$30 million in damages in connection with an alleged link between inhaled microwave popcorn vapors and certain lung conditions. After jury selection, the firm discovered that one of the jurors had posted anti-business statements on social media and successfully had the juror stricken from the case. **Mike Hatch**, the Minnesota attorney general from 1999 to 2007, handles health care, antitrust, insurance and white-collar criminal investigations. During the 2011 Minnesota state government shutdown, he won an appeal to keep the Minnesota Zoo open during its peak season, based on the argument that it could operate on its owned revenue despite partial reliance on government funds.

Briggs and Morgan

The longstanding firm Briggs and Morgan straddles both sides of the Mississippi River with offices in both Minneapolis and St. Paul. Its litigation core is based in the heart

of Minneapolis's financial district, conveniently located to the firm's extensive banking and finance clientele, as well as a burgeoning agribusiness and food sector. A competitor speaks highly of the firm's courtroom demeanor: "You can shake hands, fight, and shake hands again." **Frank Taylor** was on a team that had \$350 million of class-action claims dismissed against his

branch offices in the central Minnesota college town of St. Cloud and in Washington, DC. The firm's clients include Campbell Soup Company, Imation, International Dairy Queen, St. Olaf College, the University of Minnesota Physicians and for-profit higher educational institution National American University. The firm handles an array of practice areas tailored to

Bismarck, North Dakota and Washington, DC. Former Minnesota deputy attorney general **Byron Starns**, whom a peer describes as being "very thoughtful," is known for his energy, environmental and real estate litigation work. Securities and class action specialist **Todd Noteboom**, as well as fellow local litigation star **Lawrence Field** and future star **Elizabeth Wiet Reutter**, have been representing State Farm Mutual Automobile Insurance Company in a class-action lawsuit that questioned how the insurer offered and priced coverage for underinsured drivers, known as UIM coverage. The plaintiffs were denied class certification in 2011; State Farm was granted motion for summary judgment as to two of the three class representatives.

client, a national independent securities broker and dealer. The plaintiffs had alleged they were victims of a Ponzi scheme. A peer raves about Taylor, "He's a bomb thrower!" Future star **Kevin Decker** also regularly represents financial clients accused of breaches of fiduciary duty, fraudulent transfer and related claims, particularly in bankruptcy cases related to alleged Ponzi or similarly complicated financial schemes. **Lauren Lonergan**, the head of Briggs and Morgan's business litigation group, gets nods for her practice, which encompasses ERISA, insurance and food products litigation. New future star **Jason Asmus** is "ethical, a real straight shooter and a fantastic lawyer," says a peer.

Gray Plant Mooty

Founded by a sole attorney in 1886, Gray Plant Mooty is the oldest continuously running law firm in Minnesota. Beyond its main office in Minneapolis, the firm has

key industries in Minnesota such as food and agribusiness, telecommunications, franchise and distribution, health care, life sciences and medical devices. Local litigation star **Gregory Merz** is particularly known for his life sciences litigation. "Greg Merz is a great retail, medical malpractice guy," says a peer. Future star **Dean Eyler** is the co-chairperson of the firm's intellectual property practice. In 2012 he represented a sporting goods manufacturer, defending patent infringement claims and a declaratory judgment action to render a competitor's patent invalid.

Leonard Street and Deinard

Leonard Street and Deinard, founded in Minneapolis in 1922, is known in the Minnesota legal market for its deep corporate practice. In addition to its Twin Cities headquarters, the firm maintains offices in the Minnesota college towns of Mankato and St. Cloud, as well as

Minneapolis boutique Maslon Edelman Borman & Brand is home to more than 80 lawyers, roughly half of whom are litigators. The firm handles an array of matters including securities, intellectual property, labor and employment, real estate, insurance, construction, appellate work and general commercial disputes. "Maslon is kind of a hot firm right now—I've heard about them a lot lately," says a competitor. Testament to local litigation star **William Pentelovitch's** stature in the Minneapolis legal sector is his being tapped to represent a group of plaintiffs, including the League of Women Voters, Common Cause, Jewish Community Action and five individuals. The coalition was challenging the ballot proposal on the Minnesota state constitutional amendment requiring voters to volunteer photo identification. Pentelovitch argued the case before the Minnesota Supreme Court.
